FIERCE CONFLICT BETWEEN POLICE AND RIOTERS.

Midland Station Wrecked.

SOLDIERS CHARGE WITH FIXED BAYONETS.

Scenes of Bloodshed: Police and Rioters Wounded.

The strike of Chesterfield railwaymen culminated in unprecedented scenes of violence and bloodshed on Saturday night. For nearly four hours a mob was in the hands of a savage and frenzied mob. The disturbances, which had been threatened throughout the day, broke out with a suddenness which had the effect of temporarily demoralising all parties. By a special order of the magistracy a mob collected in the Market Square, and shortly after this a mob collected in the Market Square where an attack was made upon two policemen who were taking a rest. From this incident a general riot quickly developed. A large number of rioters were injured in the street fighting, and the police were badly cut and bruised with the missiles hurled by them.
